Weatherman Predicts Break In Heat Wave

Meteorologists finally have predicted cooling temperatures for Turlockers, who continued to sweat yesterday in heat that sent the mercury zooming over 100 degrees for the sixth straight day.

A northwest wind between 8-15 miles per hour is expected to lower temperatures to 90-100 today and 85-95 tomorrow, according to the weatherman.

Yesterday Turlock recorded an official 103 degrees at 3 p.m. it was the ninth day in June over 100 degrees and this broke the previous record of eight days set yesterday. Prior to this year, June, 1954, had prevailed with five.

Another Mark Threatened If it does not cool off, the consecutive day mark of nine established between June 2 and July 6 in 1950 may be eclipsed. During the heat wave of 1950, the all-time high of 112 was set June 30.

The Turlock Irrigation District noted it was encouraging that today's reading at 11 a.m. is 81, down eight from yesterday. All-time maximums for June 23, 24 and 25 were being set during the present wave. Highest mark this year was the 108 registered Monday.

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Modestan Offers To Be Killer's Victim

CHALLENGER — Joe Stine of Modesto, brother of a slain San Francisco car driver, works in a southwest Modesto service station. Will he be the Zodiac's next victim?

Joe Stine, 34, of Modesto, low Cab Co. in San Francisco. brother of a San Francisco cab driver slain by the killer known as Zodiac, offered himself today as the Zodiac's next victim.

"I've been thinking about it since they found that little girl killed in San Jose," Joe Stine said as he tightened a tie rod on a car in the southwest Modesto service station where he works as a mechanic.

Brother Died

"I decided to do it this morning and called the (San Francisco) Examiner and told them," Stine said. "It's pretty hard to lose a brother and just forget about it. Maybe if he makes an attempt on me they can close the area off and get him."

Joe's brother Paul, 29, was shot to death Oct. 11 while working the night shift for the Yel-

low Cab Co. in San Francisco.

has called himself the Zodiac.

While Joe Stine, who lives with his mother in a small home in south Modesto, admits to being nervous about the prospect of the killer taking up his challenge, the only evidence of any nervousness is the pre-caution he takes when leaving the lube room for the gas pumps.

Checks Driver

A man in a pickup truck pulled into the station, setting off the customer gong. Joe walked slowly to the lube room door then, satisfied the driver was not Zodiac, walked out to wait on him.

Joe was asked if he thinks the killer will accept his challenge. "I hope he does, though I'm not real brave about it. Actually I figure he will," Stine added.

Joe Stine is small, balding and has flashing blue eyes. He wears a brown uniform when he works at Merle Barnes Richfield service station at Sutter and Rouse Avenues. His arms are coated with grease and there are cuts on his knuckles from slips of the wrench.

"I gave the Examiner my work schedule to make it easier for Zodiac," Joe says. "I go to work at 7 a.m. and am off at 5 p.m. I go to lunch every day

at the Walking Chicken up at the corner at noon."

Doesn't Know

What is the reaction of the woman whose youngest son has already been slain by Zodiac and whose oldest son has offered himself to be a target for the killer?

"She doesn't know yet," Stine answers. "But I'm going to catch hell when she does. I'm going to catch hell from my relatives too."

Audra Harrison, mother of Joe and Paul Stine, has been under heavy medication since the death of Paul, Joe said. Joe lives alone with his mother. His ex-wife has Joe's only child, an 8-year old boy. Joe will not tell where they live.

Joe graduated from Sonora High School, spent half a semester at Modesto Junior College and a semester at business school before he joined the Army. He spent seven years in the service and was stationed in Korea and France.

Although Joe spends his days working on cars, he does not work alone. He rides a rickety bicycle to work.

Joe has not asked for any police protection. He is not carrying a weapon.

'Zodiac' killer

Police seek astrologer's help in murder spree

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—A 10-man team of detectives has consulted an astrologer for help in its search for a man who calls himself "Zodiac."

The killings began last December when a teen-age couple was slain in a lovers lane near Vallejo, about 30 miles northwest of here. The attacker wrote the dates of the Vallejo killings on her car door.

Another girl was slain in Vallejo in July.

Then "Zodiac"

began sending coded letters to

a dimly apprehensive about another murder occurring in the near future."

"Zodiac" concluded his note with a chilling threat.

"School children make nice targets," he wrote. "I think I shall wipe out a school bus some morning. Just shoot out the front tire and then pick off the kiddies as they come bouncing out."

Captain Lee noted the shortening time span between the killings—seven months between the two Vallejo incidents, almost three months until the slaying at Lake Berryessa, and only two weeks between that killing and the death of Stine.

Maniac in the Ne

Californians Teri

NAPA, Calif. — Somewhere in the shady hill country around Napa and Vallejo, 25 miles north of San Francisco, lives an inconspicuous man. He has a fantastic secret, though, and if people only knew . . . well, then they wouldn't ignore him.

He's fairly bright, but his spelling and grammar indicate a poor education, so he probably doesn't have a very good job.

He's about 6 feet, 35 or perhaps younger, has wavy, light brown hair, and he's fat — well over 200 pounds — so he probably doesn't do too well with girls. In fact, he has unwittingly indicated a sexual inadequacy. But he would never knowingly admit it. He's very guarded about personal matters.

He could be old Mrs. So-and-So's boy, who never says boo and still lives at home. Or that bachelor who keeps to himself and never seems to have any fun. Or that poor guy who works so hard at that lousy job and never complains and never lets on that his marriage is miserable, that his wife is a slut, or a srew. Oh, and he's an astrology fan. He's adopted a nickname: "The Zodiac." And when the signs are right, he goes out and finds young boys and girls together — who symbolize everything life has denied him.

And he kills them.

FIVE DAYS before last Christmas, David Faraday picked up Betty Lou Jensen to take her to a Christmas concert at her high school.

David was 17, an Eagle Scout who had won the God and Country Award, and a popular member of the wrestling team at Vallejo High School. Betty Lou, 16, was a member of Rainbow Girls at Hogan High. It was their first date.

THE CONCERT ended well before midnight, and David and Betty Lou drove out to Lake Herman Reservoir, a few miles east of Vallejo, to a spot where the view was nice. The stars were bright and there was a big moon. . . .

About 11 p.m., the young couple were startled by the thin beam of a pencil flashlight very close by. They hadn't heard a sound. A gun spat, and David fell out the open car door, shot through the head.

Betty Lou scrambled out the other side and raced desperately into the dark, but the needle of light followed her and she was brought down some 30 feet away, five bullets in her back and head.

When a rancher's wife happened upon the two bodies at 11:24 p.m., the car's motor was warm and the heater was running. The killer had vanished.

There were no witnesses. How the youngsters were killed was described by

the killer himself. But that was not until seven months later.

IN THE SMALL hours of July 5, Mrs. Darleen Ferrin, 22, a Vallejo waitress, was in her car in a lot off Columbus Parkway in Blue Rock Springs Park with Michael Mageau, 19, a Vallejo youth who worked for his father.

They parked less than two miles from where David Faraday and Betty Lou Jensen had parked one night in December.

Shortly after midnight, Mageau later told police, a man "just walked up to the car and started shooting, without saying a word."

Three passersby soon reported being

within earshot of the crime and hearing a car speed out of the lot, engine racing and tires screeching.

It was a brown car, its body similar to a 1963 Corvair, police were tipped later.

WITHIN AN HOUR after the shooting, police received an anonymous call from a Vallejo pay phone. A youthful-sounding voice announced, "I shot them. I used a 9-mm. automatic." Then he hung up.

Remarked one officer: "We've got a crazy man on the loose."

But no "crazy man" — no frothing psychopath, no hot-eyed maniac, no one at all turned up. For nearly four weeks, while Mageau slowly recovered, police searched the victims' backgrounds — for a love triangle, for jealousy, for any motivation in their selection.

Police found none because there was none. They were shot simply because they were there.

IT WAS ON Aug. 1 that the madness really bubbled to the surface.

The bulky envelope, postmarked July 31 in San Francisco and marked "please rush to editor," arrived Aug. 1 at Gibson Publications, publishers of the Morning Vallejo Times-Herald and Evening News-Chronicle.

It contained a cryptogram, made up of letters and strange symbols arranged in eight lines of 17 characters each. And this crudely printed, eerie note:

"DEAR EDITOR,

"I am the killer of the 2 teen-agers last Christmas at Lake Herman and the girl last 4th of July. To prove this I shall state some facts which I only and the police know.

"Christmas

"1. Brand name of Ammo Super X

"2. 10 shots fired

"3. Boy was on back feet to car

"4. Girl was lying (SIC) on right side feet to west

"4TH OF JULY

"1. Girl was wearing patterned pants

"2. Boy was also shot in knee

"3. Brand name of ammo was West-

ern

"Here is a cypher (SIC) or that is part of one. The other 2 parts have been mailed to the S.F. Examiner and the S.F. Chronicle.

"I want you to print the cipher on your front page by Fry afternoon Aug. 16. If you do not do this I will go on a killing rampage Fry night that will last the whole weekend. I will cruise (SIC) around and pick of (SIC) all stray people and couples that are alone (SIC). Then move on to kill some more until (SIC) I have killed over a dozen people."

At the bottom was a "signature" consisting of a circle bisected by a cross, its arms extending beyond the circle.

The anonymous writer had mailed the other parts of the cipher to the San Francisco papers, along with similar notes warning that he would go on a killing rampage if the ciphers didn't make Page 1.

Police set cryptographers to work to crack the difficult code.

THE ASSEMBLED cryptogram contained a bewildering mixture of English letters, Greek letters, English letters reversed and upside down, and symbols that have been used in primitive mythologies since the dawn of man.

Virtually all the symbols appear variously in the ancient Egyptian Book of the Dead, in works on the legendary lost continent of Mu, in Asian and South Pacific primitive mythology, in American Indian rock carvings, in foreign alphabets, ancient and modern, and in astrology and astronomy.

THE WRITER had said that "when they do crack it they will have me." Was his name, or some other vital clue, written in the cryptogram?

The code was cracked by Donald Harden, a high school history and economics teacher in Salinas, and his wife.

On Aug. 8 the Hardens cracked the code. The madman's message — misspelled, ungrammatical and containing errors in the use of his own code — was this:

"I like killing people because it is more fun than killing wild game in the forest because man is the most dangerous animal of all to kill something gives me the most thrillng experiance . . . The best part of it is that when I die I will be reborn in paradise and all the I have killed will become my slaves I will not give you my name because you will try to stoil down or stop my collecting of slaves for my afterlife . . ."

The last line consists of four unintelli-

gible words: "Ebo riet emeth hriti." A name? An address? A town? They are still a puzzle.

Vallejo Det. Sgt. John Lynch was at last convinced: "There is no doubt in my mind that this is a true translation of the cipher and that the murderer wrote it," he said.

"I THINK perhaps the man's name is in the cryptogram, possibly in the last four words," Harden, after cracking the code, formed these general theories about its author:

- He is bright enough, but not necessarily of high intellect.
- He may be in or near middle age, because he uses one term (not revealed by police) that has dropped out of general slang use.

Dr. Leonti Thompson, a psychiatrist at Napa State Hospital 15 miles north of Vallejo, has found a number of different meanings in the killer's crossed-circle "signature." In one primitive culture it represents the earth; in another, the ancient notion of the four elements that make up the world: earth, air, fire and water.

Still another symbol, the "X," represented water in the alphabet of the legendary continent of Mu. "And the killings took place near water," Thompson notes speculatively.

AND THE USE of astrological symbols in the code, in addition to the killer's nicknaming himself "The Zodiac," have caused police to wonder if he might be following his horoscope in choosing when to kill again.

A psychiatrist at the California Medical Facility in Vacaville, contacted by Vallejo police as soon as the cipher was cracked, said on Aug. 11 that it was "the work of someone you would expect to be brooding and isolated."

"HE PROBABLY is a guy who broods about cutoff feelings, about being cut off from his fellow man . . . comparing the thrill of killing to the satisfaction of sex is usually an expression of inadequacy. He probably feels his fellow man looks down on him for some reason."

The belief that his victims would be his slaves in an afterlife reflects a feeling of omnipotence, the unnamed psychiatrist added, indicating a paranoid delusion of grandeur — expressed through a belief common among primitive peoples throughout history.

And the taunting notes and phone calls may be a plea to be found out, exposed, perhaps cornered — in which event, the psychiatrist said, a grandiose paranoid quite likely might take his own life, as a grand gesture to punish the world for its neglect of him in life.

And could it still be a hoax? The psy-

As she was being knifed in the back, officers said, she apparently rolled over in pain and was stabbed in each breast, in the stomach and in the groin, in the pattern of a cross.

MEANWHILE, only an hour after the attack, the phone rang at the Napa police station, and a voice said:

"I want to report a murder — no, a double murder. They are two miles north of park headquarters. They were in a white Volkswagen Karmann-Ghia."

There was a pause . . . "And I'm the one that did it." Then the line went dead. Police soon traced the call to a Napa pay phone outside a main Street carwash.

The receiver was dangling off the hook.

And soon Napa authorities knew that Vallejo's code killer had moved north. They found Hartnell's car, and on the door, written with same kind of felt-tipped pen that had drawn the cryptogram, was the by-now-familiar crossed-circle signature. Under it was written:

Vallejo
Dec. 20, 1968
July 4, 1969
Sept. 27, 1969 — 6:30 p.m.

At Queen of the Valley Hospital, Cecilia Ann Shepard lay barely alive for nearly two days. On Monday afternoon, Sept. 29, the pain finally ceased; the same cryptographer had claimed his fourth life.

Hartnell began a slow recovery.

LAST SATURDAY night the Zodiac killer claimed his fifth victim. San Francisco police announced Wednesday that a letter had been sent to the San Francisco Chronicle, in the same handwriting as the Zodiac killer's previous messages, in which the murderer admitted killing San Francisco cab driver Paul Stine, 29. The shooting of Stine had appeared to be a routine robbery and murder, except for one bizarre detail: a small piece of Stine's blood-soaked shirt was torn out.

The missing swatch of gray-and-white striped fabric arrived with Tuesday's mail at the Chronicle. With the swatch was a letter of warning:

"School children make nice targets. I think I shall wipe out a school bus some morning. Just shoot out the front tires and then pick off the kiddies as they come bouncing out."

"This is the Zodiac speaking. I am the murderer of the taxi driver over by Washington St. and Maple St. last night, to prove this here is a blood stained piece of his shirt. I am the same man who did in the people in the North Bay area."

Throughout the crudely printed note was the same "signature" which has figured in the previous killings — a circle bisected by a cross its arms extending beyond the circle.

FSC Students Begin Political Internships

The inside of politics is being learned by two FSC students under internships established by the Citizenship Clearinghouse of California.

Stine, a Democrat, is assigned to the Democratic County Central Committee to aid in the campaigns of Bert DeLotto and Charles B. Garrigus.

Joins Hansen Staff

Hobbs, a Republican, will work out of the county Republican committee he heads. The campaign of William W. Hansen, who is seeking reelection as assemblyman from the 33rd, Fresno County, district.

Garrigus is seeking to unseat Hansen. DeLotto, now a Fresno County supervisor, is campaigning for election as assemblyman from the 32nd, Fresno district. He is opposed by Blaine Pettitt, a Republican, who also may get a student campaign aide if the Republican central committee finds a donor to pay the expenses.

Hobbs and Stine each will get \$50 a week for 10 weeks. The Clearing House, with a grant from the Ford Foundation, is providing half the money, the central committee the rest.

School Will Interfere

Each student hopes to continue during the final weeks of the campaigns but they will be back in school, then and will have to help in their spare time.

In a way it is a part time job for Stine now. He also is holding down part time jobs as a dishwasher in a drive in restaurant and as a kennelman in a pet hospital.

Each is expected to work side by side with his candidate, learning about everything which goes into political campaign.

Robbery Victim

Cabbie Slain in Presidio Hts.

A yellow cab driver was found shot to death in his cab through the victim's pockets, then dash up Cherry Street in the direction of the Presidio Heights.

He was identified by the company as T.L. Stine.

Police said three youngsters saw a scuffle near the cab, which was stopped on Washington Street near Cherry Street, about 10 p.m.

They said they saw a man wipe off parts of the cab with

handkerchief, after going through the victim's pockets, wearing dark shoes, and dark grey trousers and jacket.

Company officials said Stine apparently picked up a fare on the street while en route to a call on Ninth Avenue.

He was shot in the back of the head, apparently with a .38 caliber revolver. The engine and meter of the cab still were running.

Wounded Cab Driver May Be 'Zodiac' Victim

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A cab driver was found shot and critically wounded in the posh Pacific Heights area early Sunday. Police said they were investigating the possibility his assailant was the mysterious killer who calls himself Zodiac.

Police on route in a patrol found Charles Jarman, 28, of Daly City, slumped behind the wheel of his cab, a bullet wound in front of his right ear. He later was reported in very critical condition at a hospital.

The cab, with its lights on and motor running, was parked just 10 blocks from where cab driver Paul Stine, 29, was shot to death last Oct. 11.

At that time Zodiac, in a letter to a local newspaper, enclosed a torn scrap from Stine's bloody shirt, and took credit for the killing. Zodiac has been linked by police to a total of five Bay Area murders.

In a recent letter to attorney Melvin Belli, Zodiac claimed eight murders and said he may take "my ninth and possibly tenth victim" unless he receives help soon.

Joe Stine, 34, a Modesto mechanic, said, "Let him come and get me. I'm still tough enough to handle Zodiac."

His brother, Paul, 29, a San Francisco cab driver, was shot in cold blood by Zodiac, who ripped a piece of the vic-

tim's shirt from his body and mailed it to police.

The hunt for a mystic mass murderer who calls himself Zodiac continued today while police tried to assess yesterday's weird television conversation between attorney Melvin Belli and a telephone caller who represented himself as the slayer of five persons.

Many people were convinced the whole thing was a hoax in which a teen-age boy was leading Belli on a wild goose chase.

Police are convinced the caller was "mentally disturbed" but they have no way of knowing for sure whether he was or wasn't Zodiac.

The brother of one of the victims, meanwhile, offered himself as a living target for Zodiac.

Belli is convinced he was talking to the right man and said, "Something desperate is going to happen. This guy is a madman and I can feel a storm brewing up inside him.

I hope he will get in touch with me soon." Police arranged for the famed attorney to appear on the KGO Jim Dunbar talk show yesterday morning after a man called them and said he trusted only Belli or F. Lee Bailey, the "Boston Strangler's" lawyer.

A meeting in Daly City was arranged, but Belli waited 45 minutes without results. Police had the location under surveillance and temporarily quizzed one man who fitted the killer's description, which has been supplied by witnesses.

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

They also paid special attention to the Fairmont Hotel, where the caller at first said he would meet Belli. A waitress in a hotel coffee shop said she saw a man who looked like a drawing of the killer.

That was the case everywhere in the Bay Area. Police were inundated with calls from people who "saw" or thought they saw the man.

A police guard of school buses continued in most cities and counties, since the killer's last note said he was considering wiping out a busload of school children.

Once in the conversation the caller, who claimed he was having headaches, said, "I've got to kill those kids."

He made about a dozen short, untraceable calls to Belli in which he said he needs help, is sick and has to kill.

Zodiac's New Message

Here are portions of the seven-page letter, with the original spelling and grammar, which Zodiac sent to The Chronicle:

This is the Zodiac speaking up to the end of Oct I have killed 7 people. I have grown rather angry with the police for their telling lies about me. So I shall change the way the collecting of slaves. I shall no longer announce to anyone when I committ my murders, they shall look like routine robberies, killings of anger, & a few fake accidents, etc.

The police shall never catch me because I have been too clever for them.

1. I look like the description passed out only when I do my thing, the rest of the time I look entirle different I shall not tell you what my descipte consists of when I kill.

2. As of yet I have left no fingerprints behind me contrary to what the police say in my killings I wear transparent finger tip guards. All it is is 2 coats of airplane cement coated on my finger tips — quite unnoticible & very efective.

3. My killing tools have been boughten through the mail order outfit before the

Zodiac at this point signed the letter with his familiar sign: a circle with two lines drawn through it.) Then he added:

PS. Be shure to print the part I marked out on page 3 or I shall do my thing.

To prove that I am the Zodiac, Ask the Vallejo cop about my electric gun sight which I used to start my collecting of slaves.

Victims

The Pattern of Zodiac's Killings

"Zodiac" previously has claimed credit for four savage attacks in which he killed five persons and critically wounded two others. Here is an account of those crimes:

• December 20, 1968, near Vallejo — David Faraday, 17, and Betty Lou Jensen, 16, were both fatally wounded when Zodiac came upon them in the couple's car parked at the Lake Herman reservoir, a local lovers' lane, a few miles east of Vallejo. It was 11:14 p.m.

The weapon was a .22-caliber pistol. Faraday died instantaneously of a shot that smashed his skull. Miss Jensen, attempting to flee, was brought down by five shots fired into her back. She, too, was dead when a passing motorist saw the bodies and notified the Solano county sheriff's department.

The seemingly senseless murders were not immediately linked to the Zodiac. He had not yet begun to boast. July 5, 1969, in Vallejo — Darleen Ferrin, 22, was killed and Michael Mageau, 19, was critically wounded tie up Hartnell with a piece of plastic clothesline and then he tied her up. There was conversation between the killer and the couple for some 15 minutes.

The weapon was a 9-mm. Luger pistol. Mageau said a man appeared at the car window and, without saying a word, suddenly began shooting. One of several bullets that struck Mageau shattered his jaw and he lost consciousness. Mrs. Ferrin was also hit several times by shugs that passed through

Hartnell was released from the police on October 9 and returned to Pacific Union College where he is a pre-law major.

CALL

Within an hour of the attack, the police received an anonymous call in which a man's voice said: "I shot them. I used a 9-mm. Luger automatic."

It was not until August 1, when The Chronicle and other newspapers received parts of the now famous cryptogram and notes from Zodiac, that the two Solano

the lights and erratic driving if necessary."

Lynch made a personal appeal to the killer to surrender. "We will see," Lynch said, "that he gets help and that all his rights are protected. He is obviously in intelligent individual. He knows that eventually he will be taken into custody, so it would be best that he give himself up before tragedy is written in blood."

The killer's phone calls to police and his elaborately detailed letters to Bay area newspapers — in which he taunts police for their failure to catch him — are viewed by psychiatrists as revealing several significant, possibly conflicting, personality traits. He has a hunger for publicity which could indicate a person who feels he is neglected, that life is passed him by, that he is looked down upon or despised, that his superiority is not properly recognized.

He may have a deep desire—which he himself may not realize—to be caught and receive medical attention, but is unable to admit it knowingly or to forego the little displays of cleverness which illustrate his unrecognized gifts.

Breaks Pattern Armstrong admitted Saturday that the Zodiac's willingness may even by the reason why he killed Stine: to break his apparent pattern of previous killings and thus muddy the psychiatric picture that has been drawn of him so far.

Before Stine, all the victims were young couples, off together in romantic locations. Last Dec. 20, he shot and killed David Faraday, 17, and Betty Lou Jensen, 16, both of Vallejo. July 5 he shot Mrs. Darlene Ferrin, 22, and Michael Mageau, 19, both of Vallejo. Mageau survived.

STABBING Suddenly, with no warning, Zodiac shoved the pistol he was holding into his belt and drew the knife. He started stabbing Hartnell first and then turned his attention to Miss Shepard. Hartnell suffered more than a dozen wounds. Miss Shepard was stabbed some 23 times.

A fisherman in a boat finally heard their cries for help and, several hours after the attack, they were taken to Queen of the Valley Hospital in Napa where, two days later, Miss Shepard died.

At the scene of the Lake Berryessa attack, Zodiac scrawled his sign on the side of Hartnell's car and the dates of the Vallejo killings.

Then, in an apparent switch from pattern, the killer shot and robbed Stine, a lone man, in the Presidio Heights district of San Francisco, 30 miles

An accompanying letter boasted of the Faraday-Jensen and Ferrin murders, and the subsequently decoded cryptogram described how killing people was "more fun than killing wild game in the forest because man is the most dangerous animal. To kill something gives me the most thrilling experience."

Message on Car

After the September attack at Lake Berryessa, the killer also phoned police and wrote the dates of the previous killings on the door of Hartnell's car. His messages were all signed with the crossed-circle symbol which is thought to be the killer's representation of the sign of the Zodiac.

He also begins his chilling letters with the statement: "This is the Zodiac speaking," causing authorities to speculate that the killer may be an astrological fan who picks his death-dates by consulting his horoscope.

Armsstrong said his department was consulting with experts in sorting through the killer's communications in an effort to determine whether there are other messages, buried on a deeper level, of translation than the messages thus far decoded.

Meanwhile, police and sheriffs' officers in the Bay area have checked out hundreds of persons in their hunt for the killer. More than 1,000 tips were telephoned to authorities Saturday from alarmed residents.

As the days pass with no likely suspect being captured, Armstrong notes that psychiatrists believe the killer may be accelerating in the psychotic rage that causes him to kill.

It was after the July killing that the murderer first phoned police. Four weeks later, he mailed a complicated cryptogram, in three parts, to the San Francisco Chronicle, the San Francisco Examiner and the Vallejo News-Chronicle.

This much police already know from information provided from two survivors of his first two attacks: He has 5 feet 8 inches to 6 feet tall, and his age is between 35 and 40.

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9-mm Pistol Is a Gun for Killing

The gun used by "Zodiac," killer of five Bay Area persons in the past 10 months, offered police their best clue today in the hunt to stop him before he strikes again.

Only 143 weapons similar to that which fired the fatal 9 mm. slugs used in two of the murders have been sold in San Francisco over the past three years.

Applications of everyone who bought such a weapon were being examined today to compare the handwriting with that on the "Zodiac" newspaper boasting of his deeds.

Investigators concentrated on this lead today as police descended on young couples in roomantic, lonely spots, leading investigators to conclude they were dealing with a psychotic driven by dark, sexual motives. There was no serious attempt at robbery.

Special to The Examiner LOS GATOS — Sheriff's deputies started a finecomb search at dawn today for the knife used to stab and slash a two year old girl to death in a vineyard behind her home here last night.

The body of Shelley Irene Holmboe was found by one of a group of neighbors looking for her after her parents reported her missing.

Shelley had been seen playing in the yard of her home, 1709 Peony Lane, during the afternoon. She was gone about 6 p.m., and the body was found two hours later.

The latest letter Zodiac sent to The Chronicle claiming the murder of Stine was in the same handwriting of past taunting, messages—"There are no dissimilarities," Captain Lee said.

All the letters were postmarked San Francisco, but police are not sure whether they are pursuing a man who lives here or in the area of the other murders.

On the first of August, Zodiac sent cryptograms to newspapers with a note claiming the first three murderers and saying the puzzle contained his name.

It apparently did not. When finally cracked, the code proved to be a rambling, chilling declaration by the writer that killing people "is more fun" than killing animals.

Zodiac said he believed that all the people he killed will become his slaves in paradise.

Authorities consulted a psychiatrist at the California Medical Facility at Vacaville. On the basis of the boasting messages and the method of murder, the doctor speculated:

"He is probably a guy who broods about cutoff feelings about being cut off from his fellow man . . . Comparing the thrill of killing to the satisfaction of sex is usually an expression of inadequacy. He probably feels his fellowmen looks down on him for some reason."

The taunting notes and telephone calls could be a hidden plea to be captured.

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Bay Killer's Shrinking Timetable

The bragging, psychopathic killer who wants to be known as "Zodiac" appears to follow a compulsive timetable of his own and the periodic, murderous outbursts are drawing closer together.

This ominous pattern emerged yesterday as police, working on the assumption that one man is responsible for five Bay Area killings, chased down he scores of leads. Investigators also noted that the murder of San Francisco cab driver Paul Stine occurred on a weekend — as do have all the other killings that "Zodiac" claims.

The dates of the murders are December 20 (1968) in the Vallejo area (two victims), July 5 in the Vallejo area, September 27 at Lake Berryessa near Napa and October 11 in San Francisco. Almost seven months elapsed between the first and second murders; not quite three between the second and third attacks; two weeks between the third and the killing of Stine in San Francisco.

Captain Marly Lee, chief of inspectors, said: "It doesn't make us any happier that they are getting closer together."

29, in San Francisco's Presidio Heights on October 11.

Until laboratory tests were concluded, Lee said, it was thought the 9-mm. weapon was the same one Zodiac had killed with in Vallejo.

The search for three guns was pressed yesterday throughout Northern California. Gun dealers were being questioned about purchases of .22-caliber and 9-mm. handguns, and ammunition for such weapons. Signatures on gun registration forms were being compared with handwriting on notes authored by Zodiac.

Investigators don't feel Zodiac will be found this way.

SMART

"He seems smart enough to know that a handgun sold through a store in California would have to be registered and therefore could be traced to him," said one. "But we are checking all such sales on the chance he made a mistake."

Chief Inspector Lee guessed that there are thousands of .22-caliber and 9-mm. pistols in Northern California.

The .22 caliber is a favorite of target shooters, although not automatic models. The 9-mm. is a more unusual weapon in the U.S. It was made famous by the Germans through the Luger model. There are also other well-known 9-mm. handguns such as the Astra 600, P-38 and Mauser models.

PURCHASES

Until new Federal gun laws went into effect earlier this year, many foreign-made 9-mm. models could be purchased through the mail from dozens of outlets advertising in as many magazines.

The search for the knife seems almost as hopeless. Napa county sheriff's investigators said the description fits kitchen carving knives commonly sold in all sorts of retail outlets such as department and hardware stores and even supermarkets.

The knife, with a blade believed six to eight inches long, was wielded by Zodiac in a savage attack at Lake Berryessa last September 27 in which Cecilia Ann Shepard, 22, died of the more than 20 wounds he inflicted. Her companion, Bryan Hartnell, 20, survived a dozen wounds. Authorization in many
